LADY KEANE COLLEGE, SHILLONG, established in July 1935, is being run by its Governing Body under the sponsorship of Lady Keane College Educational Society (registered under the Meghalaya Societies Registration Act, 12 of 1983 with Registration No. E.16(RS)5/of 2006/7). The College was named after Lady Joyce M. Keane – wife of Sir Michael Keane, Governor of Assam (1932-37) – who as a patron, was instrumental in inspiring the founding members and securing the plot of government cantonment land for building the first educational institution exclusively for girls and young women in North East India. First affiliated to Calcutta University in 1938, Lady Keane College got its affiliation status transferred to Gauhati University in 1948, and subsequently has been one of the premier colleges affiliated to the North-Eastern Hill University since 1973. Much has changed over time especially in the progress of our youth today when gender has taken a backseat.

The College has a clear mission to transform and prepare our students to become global citizens with the capacity to contribute – through dynamic application – towards greater good, harmony, equality and justice, irrespective of gender, race, caste and religion. This year 2024 has created history when for the first time the Governing Body of the College has made a categorical resolution to make our institution co-educational in all Science departments and Professional courses. We are here to equip our learners with the skills to tackle the challenges of a fast-paced world of information and technology. Besides the new 4-year Under-Graduate Programs, BCA, and BTTM we also offer job-oriented courses in Fashion Designing, Mushroom cultivation, MS Office (computer), and some Languages. As soon as the various NEP Courses are settled, our College will intensely pursue to start the PG Courses.

LADY KEANE COLLEGE - A BRIEF HISTORY

Lady Keane College, a pioneer in the field of education in the North- Eastern region of India, was established in the year 1935. It initially started as an Intermediate College for girls when a number of prominent citizens of Shillong met and resolved to start the college. A managing committee was constituted with Shri A. Das as the Secretary. A bungalow called "Grove side" was acquired. The Bungalow housed the College girls for two years and was the nucleus of all the activities related to the acquisition of a permanent site for Lady Keane College. It was in the first meeting of the Managing Committee at the Groveside on the 23rd of May 1935 that a resolution was passed to open an Intermediate College for the next academic session commencing in July, 1935.

The Founding fathers emphasized upon the essence and quality of education to be imparted by this prestigious College in the following words:- The Institution shall be equipped with the necessary facilities to make young minds useful and helpful members of the society' capable of taking part in activities related to the moral, social intellectual, physical and economic development of the community at large.

With a legacy of eighty nine years of eventful existence, the college has to its credit a record of very distinguished service rendered to the cause of upliftment and empowering knowledge through the spread of liberal education. The institution today, in many ways, is synonymous with the socioeconomic transformation taking place in the region and beyond.

The college has undergone several metamorphosis in the past 89 years. With the implementation of the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP), the college has geared itself into this new system since August 2023 with a positive outlook and made all necessary arrangements to overcome new challenges for a holistic and multidisciplinary undergraduate education approach with the integration of vocational courses.

The College offers four year undergraduate programmes in, Arts for women only, Science and Professional Courses as co-educational. Diploma and Certificate Courses which are designed to give the students an edge in the job market are also offered at campus.

This year 2024 the college is embarking on a pilot project to include male students into the Four Year Undergraduate Bachelor of Science program in 2024 in order to provide a balanced and comfortable environment through a Co-Educational system. At present the Bachelor of Tourism and Travel Management(BTTM) including Bachelor of Computer Applications (BCA) are running as Co-Educational Departments in preparing students for various social and professional interactions and breaking down gender stereotypes.

The College engages the students in various intellectual, physical and social exercises to promote quality education designed to mould and prepare them for the competitive 21st century life. Information and Communication Technology (ICT) lays a firm foundation for the Institution's curriculum and Remedial Classes, besides regular tutorials and classroom teachings, provide the learners with an easier accessibility to excellence. A team of highly qualified and dedicated staff has richly contributed to the success of the College, a claim that is validated by both the good results attained every year and the placement of a great body of the Alumni in prominent and prestigious positions in the society. This section is continuously reinventing itself through the initiation of new professional courses and more skill enrichment courses.

The College facilitates both academic and cultural exchange programmes with other institutions for faculty and students. Subsequent interactions on the cultural, academic and institutional levels have opened up vistas of collaborative exchanges intended to broaden and unify the teaching-learning process. The College is equipped with the necessary infrastructure for quality education. It possesses a Library with Internet facilities for both staff and students; an array of subjects, Science and Arts, conventional and professional, under well established Departments for a student to choose from; various support services and amenities; co – curricular and extracurricular activities to promote the holistic development of each student, such as: Sports, Debate, Quiz, Cultural Programmes, Tours, Excursions, Rangers, NCC, NSS and Red Cross Units.

The college was selected in 2018 by the Department of Higher Education, Ministry of HRD, Government of India, to be a recipient of the centrally sponsored scheme under the Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA), to achieve equity, access and excellence in higher education. The scheme covers core areas – viz. Infrastructure Fund and Equity Fund – that we believe will enrich the existing infrastructure, in the college for a holistic system of education.

PROCEDURE FOR ADMISSION

Application Form for admission along with one copy of the Prospectus shall be available from the College Office / Website - www.ladykeanecollege.edu.in. Each duly filled in Application Form is to be accompanied with the marksheet of SSLC, HSSLC or equivalent examinations at the time of submission.

HSSLC Marksheet downloaded from the respective Board website is also provisionally accepted for admission.

Students who wish to avail Hostel Accommodation should procure the form from the college office and submit the same to the Hostel Office after securing admission to the course opted. (Refer to page 35).

Hostel accomodation is available only to female students.

PROCEDURE TO APPLY

Online admission can be done through the College Website: www.ladykeanecollege.edu.in

Offline admission can be done in the college Campus. Admission form along with the Prospectus is available in the College Office. Duly filled in application form accompanied with photo copies of all attested testimonials is to be submitted at the time of admission.

No application will be entertained after the seats are full. The Institute will not be responsible for any delay in receipt or loss of applications in postal transit.

At the time of submission, the application form must be accompanied with the following:

- Self attested photo-copy of Admit Card and Marksheets of SSLC, HSSLC or equivalent examinations.
- Two recent passport size photographs.
- A self attested photo-copy of SC/ST/OBC, etc Certificate in case of those belonging to any of the categories.

The name of the Major and the Minor subjects chosen should be clearly indicated in the specified column.

Applicants may apply for either Day or Morning Section (Arts Subjects only) and the same is to be clearly indicated.

The Application Form is to be filled in legibly by the applicant. Incomplete forms are liable to be rejected.

In case any applicant is found to have furnished false information or certificate, etc. or is found to have withheld or concealed any information in his/her application will be debarred from admission.

It will be the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the correct address is given in the application form. The Institute will not be responsible for any loss in transit or incorrect address given by the applicant in the application form.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR PHOTOGRAPHS

- Two (2) recent passport size photographs are required.
- One photograph should be pasted (not stapled) on the Application Form.
- Another Photograph (for identity card) is to be submitted along with the Application Form.

Applications not complying with these instructions will be rejected

PROCEDURE FOR SELECTION

Based on the result of the HSSLC or equivalent examinations and fulfilment of the eligibility criteria, applicants selected for admission into the Four Year Undergraduate Programme will be given spot admission in offline mode and will be intimated by email or phone for those who applied online.

In case of failure to pay the admission fees before the date and time specified, the seats of such applicants selected would stand forfeited.

After timely payment of Fees, the candidate is considered to be provisionally admitted. The admission is confirmed after verification of the marks secured by the candidate from the original marksheet issued by the Board/University.

When an applicant is provisionally admitted, the following documents must be submitted to the College Office within one month from the date of admission.

- Self attested copy of marksheets of SSLC, HSSLC or equivalent examinations.
- A testimonial of character from the Principal of the School last attended.
- Two recent Passport size photograph of the applicant.
- Original Transfer Certificate from the School last attended (if needed)
- A Scheduled Tribe/Scheduled Caste/Other Backward Caste Certificate (Where applicable)
- Migration Certificate (in Original) for those applicants who passed from Boards/ Universities other than Meghalaya Board of School Education

A student who wishes to discontinue her studies in the College within 12 months from the start of the academic session will have to inform the HOD of the concerned Department or the Principal of the College.

ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION EXAMINATION AND EVALUATION ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION

A student should have passed the 10+2 level or Senior School Certificate Examination or any equivalent examination from a recognized Board/University.

International students are required to obtain a minimum of 60% aggregate marks in the 10+2 level/equivalent examinations for admissions to any Four Year Undergraduate Programme, subject to the approval of the University

EXAMINATION AND EVALUATION

Examination and Evaluation shall be conducted according to the Ordinances / Regulations of the North Eastern Hill University. Refer to page nos. 42-54

ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

The College conducts coaching classes for entering into services, tutorial and remedial classes.

ASSESSMENT

During the current academic session the College will conduct the following tests for all classes for assessment:

Internal assessment : There will be internal tests and assignments conducted by the College.

Students who fail to fulfil the requirements for the internal semester marks (Internal Tests and Assignments) will not be allowed to appear in the Final Semester Examination.

Departmental Seminars and Projects: Seminars are regularly held in the College to expose and enlighten the students about the newly developed fields of research relevant to their studies.

It is compulsory that the students appear in all the above tests. Permission form will be issued from the departments if they are to be selected/ not selected to appear for the final examination.

Self financing International students are to obtain permission from the Ministry of External Affairs Government Of India and from the Government Of Meghalaya.

International students under scholarship scheme are to obtain permission from the competent authority from the Government of India and from the Government of Meghalaya.

International students are required to furnish all the necessary documents at the time of admission. However such students are required to produce a valid student's Visa within one month of completion of admission, failing which their admission shall stand cancelled. A copy of the Visa is to be submitted in the College office.

Therefore, Lady Keane College, Shillong, one of the pioneered institutions of the State started a degree course in tourism and travel management to prepare students for management positions and entrepreneurship in the different sectors of the industry. ADMISSION, ASSESSMENT AND ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

1. Eligibility Criteria for Admission: Candidates who have passed the class XII examination in the 10+2 scheme or its equivalent in any discipline from any recognized board securing a minimum of 50% marks in aggregate (45% for SC/ST) are eligible for admission to the programme.

2. Admission Procedure: Admission shall be made on merit on the basis of marks obtained in the qualifying examination and/or in the entrance examination and personal interview.

3. Examination and Evaluation:

(i) Evaluation in each course/paper including Practical shall be done on the basis of performance in the internal/continuous assessment and the end-semester/external examination. The weightage for internal/continuous assessment and the end-semester/external examination shall be in the ratio of 2:3.

(ii) The continuous assessment of students shall be made on the basis of performance in (a) written tests and (b) written assignments/ seminars/quizzes and field reports etc. for determining the performance in the written test, best two out of three written tests shall be considered. In the case of practical and project works, continuous assessment shall be based on practical test/seminar/reports/viva.

(iii) In order to clear a course, a student shall have to secure at least 40% marks or C Grade in both the continuous assessment and the end-semester examination.

(iv) A student failing in continuous assessment in any course shall not be permitted to appear in the end semester examination of that course.

(v) A student, subject to payment of prescribed fees and fulfillment of other conditions laid down by the University, shall be allowed to proceed to the next semester irrespective of backlog of paper(s).

(vi) A student shall be allowed to clear the backlog of paper(s) in the relevant subsequent semester(s) within a maximum period of twelve semesters (six years).

(vii) A student shall become eligible to appear in the end-semester of a paper after payment of the prescribed examination fee and if she has fulfilled the attendance requirement.

4. Award of Grade/Division and Grade Points: In order to qualify for the BTTM Degree, a candidate must secure a minimum of 50% aggregate marks or C Grade with Grade

Point 5 and 40% or P Grade with Grade Point 4 in each paper.

5. Attendance: A student shall become eligible to appear in the end-semester/external examination of a paper if she has obtained 80 % attendance in the paper.

6. Internship: Students will have to undergo a four-month (16 weeks) internship programme in the Semester VII in any tourism and hospitality related organizations preferably outside of the state. Evaluation will be based on the Log Book maintained by the students and also the presentation of the report at the end of the semester.

7. National Fieldtrips: At the end of the Semester III, students will be taken for a National Trip to important tourism places in the country with emphasis on certain themes of tourism activities such as adventure, culture, eco-tourism, heritage, cuisine and others. Students will have to bear only 40% of the total cost incurred on accommodation, transportation and other activities at the destinations.

8. Uniforms: Students after admission will have to follow a strict professional dress code consisting of (Shirt/Blouse, Trouser and a Blazer (tie for boys)) and the expenses for the materials and stitching will be borne by the student from the retailers specified by the college.

CONDUCT OF STUDENTS

ATTENDANCE

Only students with 80% attendance will be allowed to appear in the Final Examination.

Any student who is irregular in attendance without permission or fails to join classes on the first day of classes after a vacation or holiday of a one-week duration, the following disciplinary action will be taken:

1. For the first time defaulter, the name, class and roll number will appear on the notice board as a warning.
2. Continued absence after the warning has been issued, a fine of Rs. 1000 will be imposed along with a compulsory submission of a leave-of-absence application letter.
3. The Student will have to secure a minimum of 60% in all internal tests and assignments
4. The attendance of the defaulting student will be closely monitored and any absence from any class must be informed to the Principal/Vice-Principal and the Heads of Department.
5. The Parents / Guardians of the defaulting student will be informed of the action taken.
6. Failure to abide by the above will result in expulsion from the College.

CONDUCT

- A Student must be polite, courteous and respectful towards the staff.
- must be in college uniform in the campus.
- must not distract others in the classroom in any way.
- is expected to be co-operative with all members of the staff.
- is to take responsibility for the actions and accept the consequences that may arise thereof.

DISCIPLINE

- A Student must always carry her College Identity Card and Handbook.
- Must attend all classes regularly and sit for all tests/examinations conducted during the academic session.
- Must maintain 80% attendance or be debarred from appearing for Selection/Internal/Final Examinations. A student who has been absent from classes for more than three consecutive days without intimation from her Parents/guardian will not be allowed to continue attending the classes, without permission from the College Authority.
- Is expected to participate in various academic, cultural, curricular, co-curricular and extension activities organised by the College.
- Practice of any unfair means during Examinations will lead to immediate expulsion from the College. Re-admission will not be entertained.
- A Student must not litter the campus/classroom or damage any College property.
- Use of intoxicants including drugs, chewing of betel nut and tobacco is prohibited within the College campus.
- Use of mobile phones in the College building especially classrooms and examination halls is not allowed.

The Discipline Committee of the College can impose a fine or/and expel any student who violates the College Rules and Regulations.

(CrI) No. 173/2006 and SLP(C) No. 14356/2005) and the UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009, the College has formed the an Anti-Ragging Committee, Cell and Squad for overseeing the implementation of the provisions of the verdict with immediate effect.

Definitions	<p>In this Ordinance, and in all Regulations made hereunder, unless the context otherwise requires:</p> <p>(1) "University" means North-Eastern Hill University (NEHU);</p> <p>(2) "Academic Council" means the Academic Council of the University;</p> <p>(3) "Ordinances/Regulations" means ordinances/regulations of the University;</p> <p>(4) "Programme" means a series of the courses of study leading to a Bachelor's degree or undergraduate Certificate/Diploma,</p> <p>(5) "Discipline" means a branch of knowledge;</p> <p>(6) "Subject" means a branch of discipline;</p> <p>(7) "Course" means one of the papers which comprise a specified programme of study,</p> <p>(8) "Core Courses" means courses/papers which comprise a specified programme of study</p> <p>(9) "Major Courses" means courses/papers of main focus or in-depth study of a major subject.</p> <p>(10) "Minor Courses" means core courses offered by subjects as interdisciplinary/open courses to specific subjects</p> <p>(11) "Multidisciplinary Courses" means a combination of courses/papers of more than two subjects within a broad category of disciplines;</p> <p>(12) "Vocational Education and Training Courses" means minor courses that form an integral part of the UG programmes to impart job oriented skills,</p> <p>(13) "Skill Enhancement Courses" means courses/papers on practical skills, hands-on training, soft skills, and such, to enhance the student's employability;</p> <p>(14) "Ability Enhancement Courses" means courses/papers on major Indian language and English language;</p> <p>(15) "Value Added Courses" means courses/papers on understanding India, environmental science, digital and technological solution, health and wellness, yoga education, sports, constitutional values, fundamental rights and duties, and such;</p> <p>(16) "Internship/Apprenticeship Course" means an induction course requiring a student to participate in a professional activity offered by government or recognized private/firms/labs/organizations;</p> <p>(17) "Professional Courses" means professional courses other than those regulated under OC-17;</p> <p>(18) "Credit" means a unit by which the course work is measured in terms of the number of hours of instructions required per week or semester. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching or two hours of practical work per week,</p> <p>(19) "Grade Point" means a numerical value of a letter grade on the 10-point grading scale;</p> <p>(20) "Credit Point" means the product of the grade point and the number of credits corresponding to a letter grade for a specific course;</p> <p>(21) "Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)" means the ratio of the sum of the credit points secured by a student in all courses and the total number of credits in all courses over a semester,</p> <p>(22) "Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)" means the ratio of the total credit points secured by a student in all courses and the sum of the total credits over all the semesters of a programme;</p>

Programmes	<p>(a)There shall be three or four-year undergraduate programmes in different disciplines.</p> <p>(b)The three-year undergraduate programmes shall be leading to a Bachelor's degree in single major or multidisciplinary programme.</p> <p>(c)The four-year undergraduate programmes shall be leading to a Bachelor's degree (Honours) or a Bachelor's degree (Honours with Research).</p> <p>(d)The infrastructure requirements, including faculty members, shall be as laid down in relevant Ordinances and Regulations. For a 4-year undergraduate programme in Honours with Research there shall be at least two permanent faculty members who are recognized as PhD supervisors.</p>
4.	Programme Duration	The duration of the undergraduate programmes shall be three or four years evenly spread over six or eight semesters, respectively, with exit and re-entry options.
5.	Eligibility and Criteria for Admission	<p>(a) A candidate must obtain a Senior Secondary School Leaving Certificate or Higher Secondary Certificate on successful completion of Grade 12 examination or any other equivalent examination from any recognized Board of Secondary Education.</p> <p>(b) Admission process shall be based on marks/scores in the Common University Entrance Test (CUET) conducted by the National Testing Agency (NTA), or any other authorized agency approved by the University</p> <p>(c) Admission to the second, third, and fourth-academic year of a programme shall be given to those candidates exiting the programme after the first, second, and third-academic year, respectively. Admission criteria shall be as notified by the concerned College/Higher Education Institution. Students securing less than 75% shall be eligible for undertaking Honours only.</p>
