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### 1. Report on the theatrical act: Rekindling of old folklore

The Department of Tourism and Travel management organised its first ever 'theatrical act' on the 13<sup>th</sup> April 2023, held in the college auditorium. The programme was initiated by the students of the department. The programme was conducted as part of experiential learning with a purposed of re-enacting old folklore. In this programme the students took part in various activities and performances base on the Khasis culture and tradition. The main activity of this programme was the play performed by the student.

### The objectives of the programme were as follows:-

- ➤ To engaged productivity among the student in the collaboration process.
- > To build intellectual act aesthetic understanding of the craft and technique of the theatre act.
- ➤ To develop and appreciation and request for folktales at its emphasize on Khasi and Jaintia Culture.
- > To develop an appreciation and respect for roles/aspects inherent within the theatrical process.
- ➤ To explore the diversity of theatre and its intersection with community, culture and society.
- ➤ To produce diverse production that challenge students and engaged the university community.
- > To motivate the youngsters to become entrepreneurs.
- > Rekindling the old folklore.
- > Presenting a glimpse of the Khasis culture on stage.
- ➤ Help the students build their confidence and communication skill.
- Experiential learning on event organizing, promotion and folklores

### Activities: the activities performed by the students were:-

- Singing the students performed a Khasi song named 'Niangkynjah', this song is about a connection between man and nature.
- ➤ Dance the students performed traditional dances. One of the dance is called 'Chad Sukra' which is a traditional dance of the Jaintia (sub-tribe of the Khasis) usually dance before sowing crops. The other dance was performed in Khasi attire (Jainsem: a traditional dress worn by Khasi women).

Acts – The acts were the main activity of the programme. There were two acts based on two folklores namely:

**'Death in a hut'**: The story behind Kwai, tympew, shun, and duma (betel nut, betel leaf, lime and tobacco): It's a tale of friendship between a wealthy woman, Ka Mahajon and a poor man, U Baduk who grow up together. It narrates about the important customs of giving betelnut, betel leaf with lime and tobacco to guests, friends and relatives; who visits their homes in any occasions or celebrations.

'The animal fair': A story of Animal fair' in Khasi known as 'Ka iewlurilura'. This folklore narrates about how a dog came to live with a man according to the beliefs of the Khasis.

The acts were performed taking reference from a book 'Around the hearth: Khasi legends' wrote by Kynpham Singh Nongkynrih a prominent Khasi writer. Both the folklores are important amongst the Khasis.

- 6. Communication skills: Acting enhances verbal and non verbal expression of ideas. It also improves voice projection articulation of words and fluency with language.
- 7. Emotional Outlet: In the play the students is allowed to express a range of emotions. Sadness, aggression and tension are release in a safe, controlled environment reducing antisocial behaviours.
